SUBJECT: GRANTS UPDATE

The attached grants update for November 30, 2016 (Transmittal 1) provides an overview of grant receipts in the current fiscal year (FY 2016-17), a breakdown of grant funding received by major transportation project, a summary of grant agreements approved by the Board of Harbor Commissioners (Board), as well as grant agreements pending Board approval. The report also discusses the status of outstanding and pending grant applications, and summarizes potential grant funding opportunities.

Also included is a report on projected grant receipts through Fiscal Year 2018-19 (Transmittal 2).


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# **PORT OF LOS ANGELES – GRANTS UPDATE**

November 30, 2016


#### **GRANT RECEIPTS**

The Port has received \$15.5M in grant funding in FY 2016-17 (as of November 30, 2016). This is 29.5% of the total expected FY 2016-17 grant receipts of \$52.6M. The Port generally receives grant funding for transportation projects as capital reimbursements, for environmental projects as pass-through funds to third parties working with the Port, and for security projects as operational reimbursements. Most grant receipts so far this FY are for Port transportation projects. The following chart summarizes grant reimbursements in FY 2016-17:




The total amount received this FY includes \$11.2M in state grants and \$4.3M in federal grants.

For all active transportation projects receiving grant funds, the following chart provides an update on how much funding has been reimbursed for each project across fiscal years. Note that the TRAPAC project has now been fully reimbursed.



In the last three fiscal years (FY 2014-16), the Port has received more than \$256M in grant reimbursements across all projects – security, environmental and transportation.



#### **GRANT APPROVALS**

On October 24, 2016, the Board of Harbor Commissioners (Board) approved a Port Security Grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for \$1.88M effective September 1, 2016. The grant allows for the reimbursement of funds allocated to Information Security Management System Integration and Maintenance (\$750,000); POLA Department Operation Center (DOC) Phase II (\$375,000); and POLA Security System Maintenance (\$750,000). The award is for a three year period ending August 31, 2019. A 25% cost share is required and will be funded by the Harbor Department. The Harbor Department's total cost share for the projects is \$625,000, for a total cost of \$2.5M for all three projects.

On November 17, 2016, the Board approved a Letter of Agreement (LOA) between the Harbor Department and the Los Angeles County Metropolitan Transportation Authority (LACMTA). The grant reimbursement for the Yusen Terminal Efficiency Enhancement & Truck Trip Reduction Program - Phase 2 is for \$1.99M in federal grant funding.

On December 1, 2016, the Board approved an agreement between the Harbor Department and CalTrans for a Trade Corridor Improvement Funding (TCIF) reimbursement grant of \$1.13M in state grant funding for the Yusen Terminal Efficiency Enhancement & Truck Trip Reduction Program - Phase 2 project. The Harbor Department's cost share for the Project is estimated at \$424,300 of the total estimated project construction cost of \$3.55M, including construction support services.

On December 1, 2016, the Board approved a Restated Agreement No. 16-3388 between AltaSea and the Harbor Department which includes grant award conditions to comply with the obligations that come with the receipt of a \$3M grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce Economic Development Administration (EDA). The Restated Agreement requires that AltaSea be solely responsible for complying with all obligations of the grant award. The federal grant is for partial reimbursement of an approximately \$8.6M project for developing infrastructure improvements at Berths 58-60. AltaSea will be solely responsible for complying with all obligations that are described in the grant award.

#### **PENDING GRANT APPROVALS**

Two grant agreements are currently scheduled to be considered by the Board at its December 15, 2016 meeting. They include a \$5.83M California Energy Commission grant for Advanced Yard Tractor Deployment and Eco-FRATIS Drayage Truck Efficiency Projects. This is a pass-through grant for EverPort, Clean Energy, PAI, UC Riverside and Infomagnus, with matching funds of \$1.8M from EverPort, \$0.4M from Clean Energy, \$0.2M from LA Metro, \$0.3M from PAI (FRATIS), \$0.1M from UC Riverside and \$0.04M from Infomagnus. Also scheduled is an \$800,000 US Environmental Protection Agency grant to replace 18 pieces of yard equipment at APM and TRAPAC. This is a pass-through grant for APMT and TraPac who own and will replace/convert the equipment.

#### **GRANT APPLICATIONS**

The Port is preparing to submit an application (through LACMTA) for federal funding from the U.S. Department of Transportation FAST program, in partnership with the Port of Long Beach (POLB) and the Alameda Corridor – East Construction Authority (ACECA), for the addition of two tracks to the existing Pier 400 storage/staging yard and the construction of 5,000 feet of track and crossovers serving the TraPac and West Basin Container Terminal on-dock railyards. These projects, along with one from POLB and two from ACECA, are being submitted as the Southern California Rail Program, with a total of \$81.2 million in federal grant requests for projects totaling \$276.5 million. The two Port of Los Angeles projects include \$17.38 million in grant funding requests with total project costs of \$32.95 million. The application to the U.S. DOT is due December 15, 2016.

In September 2016, the Port submitted an application to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) via the State of California for \$1.5M in federal funding to partially pay for the proposed 10' x 1,100' floating docks between Berths 79 and 84 at the new San Pedro Public Market to accommodate guest vessels up to 200' in length. The \$5.7M project would include \$4.2M in matching funds from the Port. USFWS is scheduled to make a determination about the grant by March 2017.

In October 2016, the Port submitted an application to the U.S. National Park Service for \$363,450 in federal funding under the Japanese American Confinement Sites Program for an archeological excavation of a portion of Terminal Island once occupied by the Japanese Fishing Village. The Port will partner with the Japanese American National Museum to display artifacts once the project is completed. The Port will provide \$188,558 in staff and funding assistance for the \$552,008 project. Grant recipients will be announced by the middle of 2017.

#### POTENTIAL GRANT FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

The Port continually monitors regional, state and federal agencies for opportunities to fund Port projects and programs. Among the possible projects and funding sources:

- State funds through CalTrans or Southern California Association of Governments for San Pedro Waterfront Promenade project;
- Proposition 1B funds through CARB for emissions reduction projects;
- Federal Transportation Investment Generating Recovery Program (TIGER) funds through the US Department of Transportation for Evergreen and/or Yang Ming infrastructure projects;
- Federal Port Security Grant funds through FEMA for non-capital security projects;

- Federal funds through the US Department of Commerce for San Pedro Waterfront infrastructure;
- Los Angeles County Sales Tax Measure M (approved in November 2016) to fund Port transportation projects;
- Volkswagen Consent Decree Mitigation Funds (approximately \$1.2 billion for California).
