SUBJECT: GRANTS UPDATE

The coordination of federal, state and other grant reporting is now within the Contracts and Purchasing Division of the Harbor Department's Finance and Administration Bureau. The attached grants update for November 30, 2015 (Transmittal 1) provides an overview of grant receipts in the current fiscal year (FY 2015-16), a breakdown of grant funding received by major transportation project, the status of pending grant applications, and a look at upcoming grant funding opportunities.

Further grant receipt details are provided in the Federal/State Grant Receipts report (Transmittal 2). Also included is a prioritized project list (Transmittal 3) developed as part of a Long-Range Transportation Plan (LRTP) through the Metropolitan Transportation Authority that would seek funds through a potential Los Angeles County sales tax measure in November 2016. There are up to \$1.2 billion in Port of Los Angeles projects that could be requested for funding.




# **PORT OF LOS ANGELES – GRANTS UPDATE**

November 30, 2015


#### **GRANT RECEIPTS**

The Port has received \$15.71M in grant funding in FY 2015-16 through November 30, 2015. This is 30.62% of the total expected grant revenues of \$51.3M. The Port generally receives grant funding for transportation, environmental and security projects. Nearly all grant revenues this FY are for Port transportation projects. The following chart includes all active projects with grant reimbursements this FY:




The total amount received this FY includes \$11.41M in state grants and \$4.29M in federal grants.

For all active transportation projects receiving grant funds, the following chart provides an update on how much funding has been reimbursed for each project across fiscal years.



In the last two fiscal years (FY 2013-14 and 2014-15), the Port has received more than \$219M in grant reimbursements across all projects – security, environmental and transportation.



#### PENDING GRANT APPLICATIONS

The Port has applied for \$12M from the California Air Resources Board (CARB) as part of its Multi-Source Cap and Trade grant program. The funding will create a Green Omni Terminal at Pasha in Wilmington to test zero and near-zero emission technologies to encourage the sustainable movement of goods. Pasha will provide the 25% matching funds requirement (\$3M) and the Harbor Department will provide in-kind services, primarily staff time. The project has an estimated completion date of April 2019.

#### **RECENT GRANT AWARDS**

In September 2015, the Metropolitan Transportation Authority (MTA) approved grant funding for two Port projects. The YTI Redevelopment Project is scheduled to receive \$4.1M and the Harbor Boulevard/Sampson Way/7<sup>th</sup> Street Reconfiguration Project is scheduled to receive \$5.0M. The Port is to provide \$1.9M and \$5.1M, respectively, in matching funds for these projects. The projects have an estimated completion date of June 2018.

The Port is entering into an agreement with the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) to award \$1.88M in Port Security Grant Program funds for Port security system maintenance, repair and installation. The amount will be matched by \$625,000 in Port funding.

#### POTENTIAL GRANT FUNDING OPPORTUNITIES

The Port continually monitors regional, state and federal agencies for opportunities to fund Port projects and programs. Among the possible projects and funding sources:

- Measure R funds through the South Bay Cities Council of Governments for Vincent Thomas Bridge/Harbor Boulevard interchange improvement project;
- State funds through CalTrans or Southern California Association of Governments for San Pedro Waterfront Promenade project:
- Proposition 1B funds through CARB for emissions reduction projects;

- Federal Transportation Investment Generating Recovery Program (TIGER) funds through the US Department of Transportation for Evergreen and/or Yang Ming infrastructure projects;
- Federal Port Security Grant funds through FEMA for non-capital security projects;
- Federal funds through the US Department of Commerce for San Pedro Waterfront infrastructure.
- Los Angeles County Sales Tax Measure (possibly November 2016) to fund Port transportation projects
